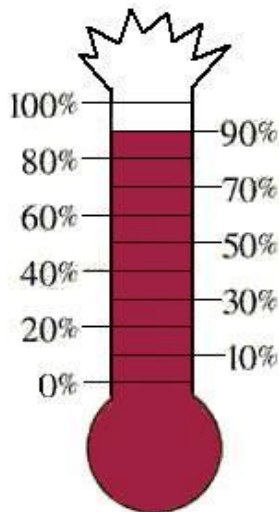




Dear Friend,

Great news! Since my last letter, **support commitments have gone up to 90%**! Praise God!! Thank you so much for your faithful support. I could not do the job in Zambia without your prayer and financial support. Once 100% of the support has been committed, I will be able to buy my ticket for Lusaka.

God has been working in other fantastic ways as well. After nearly 2 years on the market, there is finally some progress on the sale of my house. The bank has ordered an appraisal (scheduled for Monday at 4:30PM) which is the final step before they can approve the sale. I have an offer from a disabled veteran who says the house would be perfect for him. **Please pray with me that the bank would finally approve this sale and that we could close quickly. Give praise with me that things finally seem to be moving along.**



After submitting my work permit application to our Zambia team, we learned that as of August 1, everyone applying for a work permit now needs a police clearance card showing no criminal history. So off I zipped to the sheriff's department for a fingerprint card and mailed it to the FBI at the end of August. According to the the instruction sheet I received from them, it could take up to 16 weeks to be returned. **Praise God! It came back in under three weeks!!** I have mailed the PCC to our team in Zambia. **Please pray with me that my work permit will be approved quickly and without problem.**

On a related note: In the last letter, I told you about Diane Vos who is hoping to work with us in the Lusaka office. After her application for a work permit was denied by the Zambian government, Flying Mission filed an appeal. At this

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time, we have not heard back on that appeal. Diane will provide much valuable assistance in our office. **Please pray that her appeal will be granted quickly and that she will be able to move to Zambia soon.**

People often ask me exactly what I'll be doing. This summer, I had a chance to sit down with Bryan, FMZ Director, to discuss my role in more detail:

- Flight scheduling - even though much of it has been computerized, it still takes a human to ensure that we have planes going where they need to go, not overbooked, and so on. This takes 2-3 hours per day.
- Assistant to the director - I will take on any special projects and tasks, including responding to many of the hundreds of e-mails Bryan receives each week. I will also handle paying bills, some liaising with government offices, checking mail, billing our clients, etc.
- Office supervisor - as we grow, I will manage the day-to-day operations in the office in Lusaka as well as future staff that comes on board to work in the administration.

Clearly, there is much to do. Right now, the pilots are taking care of all of these tasks in addition to flying the planes and doing all of the maintenance - and trying to have time with their families.

I pray that you are experiencing God's goodness in your life every day!
